Senators that Dr. Ragsdale's term as Deputy RIO ended on Aughastnotos succeeded by Dr. Marc Pell.

Dr. Wolfson highlighted that 11allegations were received between June 1, 20020 May 31, 2021, the majority of allegations being from external sources (which includes journal editors, members of the lay public and researchers outside the McGill community) alsomentioned that during thereporting year, the Regulations Concerning the Investigation of Research Misconductwere revised, resulting in some cases being assessed under the old regulations depending on when they were received.

Senator Kik commented that, according to the report, researchweese subjected to an investigation that ultimately exonerated them26 casesAs the process takes a significant toll on researchershe asked if it were possible for the Research Integrity Office to lotok i obtaining further information on allegations before proceeding to an investigation. Dr. Wolfson responded thathe Office is required to inform the individual once an allegation is made against them and as such, the ability to conduct an investigation before providing the individual with the opportunity for a rebuttal is limited. She acknowledged that it is a stressful process for Respondents and their advisors, noting that the Research Integrity Office provides support throughout the process. She mented that even in cases with insufficient evidence of research misconduct, there could be recommendations that are made.
